

## "A Lent That Blesses"

As orders were being taken for our February hoagie sale, a question was raised: "Do you have a non-meat option?" The question was born not out of dietary concerns or some new health trend. Instead, it came out of a spiritual desire to journey with Christ to Calvary's cross and the love of God poured out upon the earth that first Good Friday. To think that a hoagie could stimulate such profound spiritual thought! Many of you, like me, grew up with an understanding that Lent is a season about sacrifice. The teaching being, Jesus sacrificed his life on the cross for us, therefore we ought to show our thanks, appreciation, or even our unworthiness, by sacrificing something of our life during the 40 days and nights of Lent. In this people have given up "meat" on Fridays, fasted on other days, abstained from chocolates and other sweets, or in other ways have 'sacrificed' something in recognition of Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

But coming back to the hoagies, one might be apt to ask why a person sacrificing meat cannot eat a slice of Lebanon bologna on Friday, but tuna is okay? And the statement, "because fish isn't a meat" just doesn't make sense. (Or at least it doesn't make sense to me.) And though one could ignore the oddity and simply rest in the assurance that the church doesn't always make sense, to do so would steal away the true riches of this profoundly spiritual practice.

The tradition of eating fish, instead of other meats on Friday, was begun with the intention of providing a means for families to save money in order to feed the poor. At the time, fish was the cheapest of meats that there was. As such families were asked during the season of Lent (and even at other times of year) to not merely enter into an act of sacrifice for their own sake of identifying with Jesus. Instead the church, the people of God, sought for ways in which Christ's act of love on the cross could be lived out in their own lives as a blessing for others. Thus, more than a practice of spiritual piety, the 'sacrifices' of

# Maundy Thursday

This experiential worship invites individuals to physically remember Jesus' last night with his disciples. Through sharing in Jesus' acts of washing the disciples' feet (in our case hands), and receiving the Lord's Supper in a meal time setting, before following Jesus to the cross, we journey with the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of world.

Individuals of all ages are welcome to this night of worship. Parents please note that this service is roughly 2 hours in length with the last part occurring in the Sanctuary with extended periods of silence and darkness. Some parents have found it best to participate in the worship up to the candlelight procession to the Sanctuary in order care for their children's needs. ## Flowering Cross

**Bring Your Flowers** 

On Easter Sunday, April 1<sup>st</sup>, bring your spring flowers (if any have arisen by that time) to the 9:30am worship to become part of Christ's flowering cross. The flowering cross is a reminder of how, in the resurrection, life overcomes death and we are brought to rejoicing in God. Flowers will also be available at the worship service (provided by Helping Hands) so that everyone can participate, as we place the flowers on the cross during communion.

## **Lenten Coin Boxes**

One of Lent's gifts is providing a defined time period in which we deepen our daily communion with God. As such the congregation provides coin boxes to use throughout the season of Lent as a means to daily call to mind the sacrifice and love of Christ for each of us. For households with children it is a wonderful way to teach about Jesus and the many blessings we have in our lives. For others, it is a daily reminder to slow down and to remember that our salvation is a gift of Christ. Be sure to pick up a coin box or Lenten giving envelope at the church entrances throughout the season of Lent.

# Beautiful Church, Beautiful Steeple, Open the Door, Beautiful People

Betty Millard—On a warm summer evening, in 1955, Betty and her sister were sitting on their front porch, enjoying the breeze and watching passersby. A young man caught their attention when seen coming down the street. Surprise crossed their faces when he climbed the steps to their porch. "Would you be interested in a movie?" he asked Betty. "What's playing?" she responded. It turned out that 'Snow White' was the movie playing. As Betty watched the Seven Dwarfs make their way across the movie screen, she enjoyed this first date with Charles (Chap) Millard. She was unaware that she was sitting next to her future husband.

Betty Eisenhower was born on September 4, 1930 to Nora (Glass) and James Eisenhower. She grew up on Bear Hill, just outside of Exeter. Betty's family lived with her Grandparents. Rebecca, Betty's grandmother, taught her how to sew. Betty's grandfather, Henry, made smoked sausage in the family's Bear Hill kitchen. Betty's face lights up when she recalls the 'good meals' the family shared and the love of her grandparents.

Betty had two sisters, Ruth, the oldest, Shirley, the 'baby', and she had a brother, Paul. Betty was the second oldest sibling. Betty and her sisters liked to visit the carnival when it came to town. They also enjoyed going to Stonersville Fire company to play Bingo. Delighted amusement crossed her face when she relayed that "Here, we were known as the 'Bingo Girls'." At this time, Betty hadn't met the young man who climbed the steps.

Chap proposed to Betty just two weeks following that first date. He knew he had found the right girl. After their marriage, the couple lived in various places throughout Berks county but eventually settled in their Birdsboro home. Their son, Jeffrey, was born in 1958. Betty's step daughter, Sandy, came to live with them, in their

First Street home, when she turned 18. During this time, Chap worked at the Steel Mill as a Pattern Maker and Betty worked at a few sewing industries including Berkshire Knitting Mill, Ship and Shore, and the Flag Company in Birdsboro. Betty is pleased to say that Chap volunteered for both the fire department and driving for the ambulance. She points out his skill in cabinetry as you pass through her kitchen. His extra stairs to guard against steep steps and his handles in doorways to protect against falls are all left behind signs of his love.

While Chap was volunteering or working as bartender at the Keystone in Birdsboro, Betty could be found cooking in the fire company's kitchen. She enjoyed spending time with the other women and was content to be near her husband. She enjoyed cooking chicken pot pie for Chap. One of her other specialties was making fasnacht doughnuts.

When asked how she occupied her time while Chap was doing carpentry work around the home, Betty motioned to be followed into the next room. There, on the bed, was a lovely soft white quilt finished with hand embroidery. Flowers and their petals followed the border and highlighted the center portion. In the same room as this beautiful tapestry were curtains that Betty had sewn. While Betty cheered Chap's many talents, she humbly shared the embroidery work she had displayed about her home.

Betty concluded her story by mentioning people, important to her life. She has two grandchildren, Eric and Brittainy, both adults now. Her nephew, Terry and his wife, Judy 'care' for Betty and "are always there when she needs them". They are a source of great comfort.

These days, Betty is unable to attend St. Paul's UCC but recalls her time of attendance with pleasure.

# Mission: Birdsboro 5K and 1 Mile Fun Run

Registration fees: 5K only \$25, 1 Mile Only \$10 or both races \$30 until Mar. 31<sup>st</sup>; after 5K only \$30, 1 Mile Only \$15 or both races \$45. # Mission Trip Birdsboro:

### Applications for Assistance Being Received

In the last 4 years, Mission Trip Birdsboro has provided support and care to over 60 homeowners in our local area. And we are looking to grow that number this year! If you, or someone you know, could benefit from the handy work of caring congregational members and community volunteers, please complete the included application (also available for completion online) and return it to the church.

Some examples of the help provided through Mission Trip Birdsboro include: landscaping, gardening, fence work, cleaning/clean up, painting, light cement work, light roof repairs, plumbing, and other projects that generally do not require permits. There are no fees associated with these services.

The main criteria are:

- 1. live within a 15 minute radius of the church
- 2. own and live in the home assistance is sought for
- 3. have an expressed need for the services provided by our volunteers

Once your application has been received, a Site Selection team member will follow up with the homeowner in order to schedule a visit to discuss the request in more detail. Final selections, and the scope of work approved, will be communicated to all applicants by the first full week in July.

## 50 Ways To Take Church To Community

From the Lewis Center for Church Leadership

# Embrace an Expansive Concept of Community

- 1. Learn to regard your community as an extension of your congregation. A church's mission field goes beyond its membership to include all the people God calls it to serve. You are connected to individuals who never set foot in your building.
- 2. Know that what's happening within the church preaching, worship, music, Bible study is no longer enough to attract people in an age when church attendance is no longer a cultural expectation.
- 3. Don't sit in your church building waiting for people to come. Be prepared to meet people where they are.

#### **Prepare Spiritually**

- 4. Acknowledge the synergy between the Great Commandment in Matthew 22 (*love your neighbor as yourself*) and the Great Commission in Matthew 28 (*go and make disciples*). Evangelistic outreach expresses our love of others.
- 5. Remember that Jesus primarily engaged people through everyday encounters, rather than in the Temple or synagogues. He fed people, met their everyday needs, and enjoyed the fellowship of others.
- 6. Express love and compassion for your community in big and small ways. Avoid judgmentalism.

- 7. Pray regularly for your neighbors and lift up community concerns.
- 8. Attend to the faith formation of existing members. Willingness to share faith and reach out to others develops as one grows in faith and discipleship.
- 9. Prepare spiritually for the transformation that creative, risk-taking outreach will bring.

# Get to Know the Community Surrounding Your Church

- 10. Review demographic data from public, private, and denominational sources, but don't assume that statistics alone will tell the whole story.
- 11. Get out in your neighborhood. Walk the streets. Map the area, and record your observations. Note how the community is changing.
- 12. Assess community needs and assets. What are the needs of your context? Who are your neighbors, and how can you serve them?
- 13. Be attuned to where God is already at work in your community.


